Tara Flynn, M.Ed.

Tara has worked in the field of education research for the past 14 years. Over the last several years, as the Director of Research for the Trent Math Education Research Collaborative, Tara oversaw longitudinal studies involving hundreds of teachers, thousands of students, partnerships with other institutions (e.g., OISE), communities (e.g., Curve Lake First Nation) and 10 Ontario school boards. She has been directly involved in writing and editing successful grant applications in the amount of nearly \$900,000. Tara has published extensively and is co-author of two books including a methodology handbook on action research for educators.



Sean Lockwood, Ph.D.

Sean is a Classical archaeologist (BA, WLU; MA, McMaster; PhD, University of Cincinnati) who spent many years gaining practical research experience on multidisciplinary projects in Turkey. He also served as a faculty member in the Department of History at Boğaziçi University in Istanbul and in Ancient History and Classics at Trent University. Since 2015 he has been a research administrator, first at the University of New Brunswick, and more recently at Wilfrid Laurier University. At these institutions he has facilitated international research partnerships, overseen the day-to-day administration of a university research centre, and helped researchers raise and manage millions of dollars in funding from federal agencies.

Inna Seviaryna, Ph.D.

Inna holds M.Sc. degree in Biology and Ph.D. in Chemistry. She has worked for several years at the Institute for Diagnostic Imaging Research at the University of Windsor. Inna also has experience outside of the higher education space, having worked with the a hi-tech company in non-destructive evaluation and biomedical ultrasound. Inna has completed the Certificate in Research Administration through the Canadian Association of Research Administrators.

SSHRC Adjudication Committee Meetings

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, SSHRC has investigated alternate approaches for holding adjudication committee meetings to respect travel restrictions and social distancing measures. As a result, all remaining SSHRC adjudication meetings for fiscal year 2020-21 will be held remotely by video-conference rather than as traditional, inperson meetings.

The actual peer review methodology will not change, and SSHRC has returned to its regular, pre-COVID processes for providing feedback to applicants. SSHRC awards funding through a rigorous and independent merit review process accessible to all disciplines, areas and approaches in the social sciences and humanities. This **independent external** merit review process adheres to internationally recognized best practices as the fairest, transparent and most effective way to allocate public research funds. If the COVID pandemic situation continues beyond the end of this fiscal year, the same approach may be used for funding opportunities to follow in 2021-22. Graham D. Raby, Assistant Professor, Biology and his co-investigators granted almost \$300k from the GREAT LAKES FISHERY COMMISSION for "Solving and applying the bioenergetics equation for walleye"

Dr. Raby and his team aim to develop and apply bioenergetics models for walleye Sander vitreus via new empirical data, harnessing the full potential of GLATOS by using transmitters that measure temperature and activity levels, and marrying

the telemetry data with experiments using modern respirometry techniques to generate more accurate data on metabolic rate. The work will build on a GLFC pilot project focused on refining respirometry methods for walleye. The project will test hypotheses about the drivers of migratory behaviours, the proximate causes of sexual size dimorphism, differences in growth among populations, and the effects of climate variability and warming (including winters) on walleye growth and reproductive output. The research work will take place between September 1, 2021 to August 30, 2025... congratulations to Dr. Raby and his co-investigators!



Hats off to Dr. Doug Evans, Professor Emeritus and Director, International Institute for Environmental Studies – Jiangsu Province award!

Dr. Doug Evans is the recipient of a 2021 Jiangsu Province International Science and Technology Cooperation Award. The Jiangsu provincial government in China every year assigns official awards to individual or entities that have achieved outstanding scientific or technology results in certain areas, and which have significantly contributed to the local socio-economic development and innovation ecosystem. Dr. Evans recognizes the significant efforts of the entire IIES organization to foster international cooperation with many Chinese organizations, and especially with Nanjing University, in receiving this prestigious award. It is the highest honour for an international recipient in Jiangsu Province to receive this award.

Collaborative Research Consortium Program (CRCP) – An EaRTH Initiative

Centennial College, Ontario Tech University, Trent University and the University of Toronto Scarborough are pleased to announce the launch of the Collaborative Research Consortium Program (CRCP), an exciting new research opportunity. The overall aim of the Program is to provide initial seed funding for the development of high-quality collaborative research projects in areas of mutual strength and shared interest that advance the Environmental and Related Technologies Hub (EaRTH) Initiative. This seed funding is available for faculty/staff at the participating institutions to undertake short-term visits to initiate, deepen and extend collaborative research links with the goal of enabling principal investigators to make joint proposals to external funding sources for the next phase of their research. The theme for the 2021 year is Integrated Sustainable Energy Technologies.

<u>Eligibility</u> A proposal must involve a team of participants that includes at least one representative from each of the four collaborating institutions. The funding envelope comprises CAD\$50,000 per project, with up to three (3) projects selected for a funding period of one (1) year.

Canada's federal research funding agencies—the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council (NSERC) and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC)—together with the Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI), offer a wide-range of funding opportunities for researchers postdoctoral fellows, graduate students and research institutions.

The integrated calendar lists the principal funding opportunities offered by the four agencies, including agency-specific programs and ones that are jointly administered. VP, Research & Innovation Strategic Initiatives Fund | Due March 15

The Vice President Research & Innovation Strategic Initiatives Fund welcomes requests from all Trent faculty, research organizations, graduate and undergraduate student groups engaged in research, and university staff working within the research enterprise. Funds are directed towards research activities for which other sources of funding are not available. Requests from academic or administrative departments are not eligible to receive support from this fund.

SSHRC Partnership Engage Grant | Due March 15

These grants provide short-term and timely support for partnered research activities that will inform decision-making at a single partner organization from the public, private or not-for-profit sector. The small-scale, stakeholder-driven partnerships supported through Partnership Engage Grants are meant to respond to immediate needs and time constraints facing organizations in non-academic sectors. In addressing an organization-specific need, challenge and/or opportunity, these partnerships let non-academic organizations and postsecondary researchers access each other's unique knowledge, expertise and capabilities on topics of mutual interest.

NSERC Herzberg, Brockhouse, Polanyi and Strickland prizes

NSERC nominations are now being accepted for the Herzberg, Brockhouse, Polanyi and Strickland prizes. The nomination deadline for all four prizes is April 1, 2021.

NSERC has established these prizes to recognize and celebrate exceptional research. Specific awards focus on accomplishments that range from interdisciplinary accomplishments to lifetime achievements and influence.

A diverse range of top researchers or teams as candidates for the following prizes are encouraged and the Office of Research θ Innovation will work with you on the application:

- The Gerhard Herzberg Canada Gold Medal for Science and Engineering is awarded annually for both the sustained excellence and overall influence of research work conducted in Canada in the natural sciences or engineering.
- The **NSERC John C. Polanyi Award** honours an individual or team whose Canadian-based research has led to a recent outstanding advance in the natural sciences or engineering. *(continued on p.7)*

Bell Let's Talk-Brain Canada Mental Health Research Program

Objective: Supports novel and transformative research that will accelerate the integration of emerging scientific knowledge into developing and improving mental health care. The ultimate goal is the development of innovative solutions to ensure effective, sustainable, and accessible mental health care for all Canadians.

Funding: This program will award grants of up to \$950,000 each, over three years to 4 Canadian research teams. Interested teams are required to submit an LOI by March 16, 2021. Following peer reviews, selected teams will be invited to proceed to the Full Application stage with deadline of July 6, 2021.

Eligibility: The funding opportunity is open to teams of two or more independent investigators from different institutions, or distinct research groups within the same institution. Teams must include at least one member with expertise in integrated Knowledge Translation. Depending on the nature of the research project, teams should include one or more of the following as collaborators: People with Lived Experience (PWLE), carers, allied-health workers, and/or health administrators.


